New National Covid Measures for Wales:

First Minister says people, not rules are key to our response

People and not rules are at the heart of Wales' response to the ongoing coronavirus pandemic, First Minister Mark Drakeford has said today as he sets out the new post-firebreak measures in Wales.

A new and simpler set of national rules will apply once the Waleswide firebreak lockdown comes to an end at 00:01 on Monday November 9.

The First Minister said everyone in Wales has "an important part to play in helping to prevent the spread of coronavirus – and this means thinking carefully about the contact we all have with other people.

"The more people we meet, the more people are at risk from coronavirus."

The new national measures, which the First Minister will start to set out today are designed to protect people's health and provide as much freedom as possible while the virus remains in circulation.

Some of the new measures are still being finalised following the unexpected announcement over the weekend about a monthlong lockdown in England, which will start on Thursday.

The new national measures include:

- The need to maintain two metre social distancing and wear face masks in enclosed public places, including on public transport and taxis, will continue;
- The requirement to work from home whenever possible will remain;
- People should only meet with their 'bubble' in their own home and only two households will be able to form a 'bubble'. If one person from either household develops symptoms, everyone should immediately self-isolate.
- Up to 15 people can take part in an organised indoors activity and up to 30 in an organised activity outdoors, providing all

social distancing, hand hygiene and other covid safety measures are followed;

- All premises, such as restaurants, cafes, pubs and gyms, closed during the firebreak, will be able to reopen. Following the announcement about the English lockdown, Ministers are having ongoing discussions with the hospitality sector about the detailed rules for reopening. This includes about meeting in public indoor spaces;
- As part of keeping our risks to a minimum, people should avoid non-essential travel as much as possible. There will be no legal restrictions on travel within Wales for residents, but international travel should be for essential reasons only.

In addition:

- All schools will reopen.
- Churches and places of worship will resume services.
- Local authority services will resume but based on local circumstances.
- Community centres will be available for small groups to meet safely indoors in the winter months.

First Minister Mark Drakeford said:

"Each of us has an important part to play in slowing the spread of coronavirus in Wales and saving lives – we cannot do this without your help.

"Everyone has made so many sacrifices this year already. To make sure we do not lose all this hard work, we need to carry on looking after each other and keeping ourselves safe.

"This is a virus which thrives on human contact. Social contact is important to all of us, but to keep ourselves and our loved ones safe, we need to think carefully about all our meetings and contacts with other people and try and reduce them to reduce our risk of infection.

"Rather than us asking what we can or can't do, we need to ask ourselves what should we be doing to keep our families safe?

"Government rules and regulations are here to help. But the real strength we have is in the choices we make and the actions we take together."

<u>WG Press Release: £300m phase of Economic</u> <u>Resilience Fund opens for applications</u>

Businesses can now apply for funding from the third phase of the Welsh Government's Economic Resilience Fund (ERF).

Last week, the Welsh Government announced it was doubling this phase of the fund, making nearly ± 300 m available to support businesses that continue to be affected by Covid-19.

As a result of the "firebreak", which began on Friday 23 October and continues until Monday 9 November, a range of businesses have had to temporarily close their doors or reduce their operations. The third round of the ERF will ensure further help for businesses across Wales.

To date, the fund has supported more than 13,000 businesses. This has helped to protect in excess of 100,000 jobs which might otherwise have been lost.

The ERF is part of the Welsh Government's £1.7bn plus support package for businesses and complements support schemes available from the UK Government.

The latest phase of the ERF will see:

- Micro businesses, SMEs and larger firms able to apply for funding from the £100m Business Development grant fund. £20m of this is ring-fenced for tourism and hospitality businesses.
- Payments of up to £5,000 for retail, hospitality and leisure businesses that are required to close and which occupy a property with a rateable value of between £12,001 and £51,000. Businesses will be automatically eligible for this funding, but will need to register and update their details via Business Wales or their Local Authority to receive it.
- Payments of £1,000 for businesses that are eligible for Small Business Rates Relief (SBRR) and occupy a property with a

rateable value of £12,000 or less. While a business will be automatically eligible for this payment, they will need to register and update their information and bank details via Business Wales or their Local Authority to access funding. Businesses qualifying for this grant will also be able to apply for additional support if they have been forced to close during fire break. Qualifying businesses subject to local restrictions prior to the fire break will also be able to apply for an additional amount of financial assistance.

• Eligible businesses that do not qualify for business rates linked grants are able to apply for awards of up to £2,000 from a £25m discretionary fund via their local authority.

Economy Minister Ken Skates said: "The latest phase of the Economic Resilience Fund will provide almost £300m of crucial support to businesses affected by the firebreak which is absolutely necessary to slow down coronavirus.

"We know this is a difficult and challenging time for our business community and that is why we are more than doubling the amount available for this round of the fund.

"From today, businesses will be able to apply for support and we will be working hard to get money out of the door as quickly as possible.

"As a Welsh Government, we are doing all that we can to protect jobs and help firms through the pandemic and against the uncertain back drop of the end of the EU transition period.

"I would also like to thank local authorities and the Welsh Local Government Association who we are working closely with to ensure we can get this important support to businesses."

- No visitors are allowed into your garden. If a firework display in your garden turns into a party at your house, you putting everyone at risk of catching COVID. Your parents will be breaking the law.
- **REMEMBER** It is illegal to buy Fireworks under the age of 18 - your parents could be prosecuted.
- You shouldn't set off fireworks in a park or other public open space. All local authorities in Wales have banned this.
- Setting off fireworks in the street is anti-social. It can be a fire risk and is against the law.
