Temporary Visitor 'PODS' for Care Homes to be rolled-out.

Temporary 'pods' are being provided to care homes across Wales to better facilitate visits over Christmas and the winter months, the Health Minister has announced today [Monday 23].

The £3million pilot will cover the procurement, installation and lease of 100 units, with an initial 30 being installed and ready to use before Christmas.

The semi-permanent units will be available for a period of 6 months, whilst longer-term solutions are sourced and put in place.

This also includes £1million for plans to support providers who prefer to make their own arrangements on a similar basis.

Expanding capacity within care homes will help to better support risk-assessed visiting during the winter months as some care providers have found it difficult to support socially distanced visits due to a lack of internal visiting space.

Visiting restrictions for care homes were eased as wider lockdown restrictions were lifted in the summer, and again following the fire-break. Since August, guidance has supported the reintroduction of indoor visits where possible with a designated indoor visitor.

Health Minister Vaughan Gething said:

"We all know how difficult recent months have been for people living in care homes and their loved ones, however ensuring the safety of our most vulnerable has always been paramount.

"We recognise both the distress and sadness that has been experienced since March, but also the desire from care homes to facilitate visits before and during Christmas as well as throughout the winter. Having engaged with key stakeholders, we are confident these units are a way to enable meaningful visits to take place.

"The pilot scheme will help us to understand whether visiting pods are an effective and practical way of supporting meaningful visits. We will use this learning to determine whether we should consider commissioning a bespoke Wales-based solution in future if the course of the pandemic means this is required."



WREXHAM C.B.C WILL PROVIDE EXTRA ACCOMMODATION AND SUPPORT FOR PEOPLE IN DEPERATE NEED OF HELP

The Covid-19 pandemic has had a significant effect on everyone's lives – not least those people who are vulnerable, and who've suffered financial and emotional hardship.

Many individuals and families who didn't need our support before the pandemic, are now in need of urgent help from the council and its partners.

As a result, we've responded to the needs of local people and successfully acquired 19 units of supported accommodation in the form of an established bed and breakfast situated within the town centre at 36 Chester Road, Wrexham.

This will provide accommodation and 'wrap around' services to help get people back on their feet.

The facility will be fully supported by an on-site team, and will be part of a wider portfolio of accommodation. Although the pandemic has created

Providing this accommodation and support for people who find themselves in desperate need of help, is another example of how Wrexham is pulling together to get through this difficult time.

BILL TO REVOLUTIONISE LOCAL GOVERNMENT AND DEMOCRACY, PASSED IN THE SENEDD.

A bill to reform local government elections, democracy, performance and governance has been passed in the Senedd.

Exactly a year since it was introduced, the Local Government and Elections (Wales) Bill will provide increased opportunities for public participation and transparency in local government.

The Bill will reduce the voting age in local government elections to 16 and 17 year-olds and extend the franchise to foreign citizens legally resident in Wales, allowing them to have a say in how their communities are run. This reflects the rights of 16 to 17 year olds and qualifying foreign citizens to register and vote in the Senedd elections next year.

Greater diversity amongst elected members in principal councils will also be supported by providing for job-sharing by office holders, more flexible remote working and updating family absence provisions.

Speaking after the Bill was passed, Minister for Housing and Local Government, Julie James said:

"This Bill will enable a local democracy which reflects our diversity as a nation, provide local government with new ways to support and serve their communities and reinvigorate local democracy in Wales." The Bill enables greater accessibility and participation in local government by making it easier to register to vote and enfranchising more people to vote. It enables more people to stand for election from a range of different backgrounds so that councils can fully reflect the communities they serve.

Increasing accessibility has been a prominent feature of the Bill, not only making it easier for people to be included on the electoral register but also easier for people to stand for election. Councils will now be required to consult and publish a public participation strategy with the aim of making it easier for local people to understand how local government functions; how it makes decisions; how local people can follow proceedings and how they can input their views and have them taken into account. To help facilitate greater participation, the bill seeks to promote more effective use of petitions within local government, introducing petitions schemes already in place with other public bodies including the Senedd.

The Welsh Government believes people should be able to watch council meetings at any time. The Bill will require principal councils to live broadcast meetings of their full council that are open to the public electronically and to make the broadcast available electronically for a reasonable period after the meeting. It will also enable more meetings to be broadcast in this way in the future. People attending community council meetings will now have greater opportunity to make representations during meetings about any business. For community and town councils the Bill will also allow for remote attendance at meetings allowing those with caring responsibilities and in employment to stand for election to this important level of local government. The Minister for Housing and Local Government said:

"The ways in which we live and work in Wales are constantly changing and our public service organisations are working hard to keep pace with that change. I believe we now have a Bill which will deliver effective reform and has been designed with local government. Anything we do to achieve greater accessibility and improved public participation in local government will be hugely valuable to Welsh democracy.

"The Bill ensures that local authorities can take a lead in making the arrangements that ensure the regions of Wales can take responsibility for their shared interest in transport planning, land use planning and economic development. This is the next step in devolution in which Welsh Government supports the regions of Wales in exercising control over what matters to them." "Some provisions in the Bill, particularly the introduction of the general power of competence and corporate joint committees, will enable councils to build on the innovation and joint working which has been central to dealing with the pandemic."

<u>GREATER WELL-BEING SUPPORT PLEDGED FOR</u> <u>SOCIAL CARE WORKERS DURING THE PANDEMIC</u>

Social care workers in the independent sector in Wales are to be given greater support to protect their well-being during the pandemic.

The emotional support, including one-to-one counselling with the same counsellor, aims to provide easy access to well-being support for care workers who have been affected by their experiences working in the pandemic.

Throughout the pandemic social care workers have continued to provide vital care and support for people who have been among the most vulnerable.

Many have been exposed to higher levels of stress, longer working hours and higher than usual number of deaths of the people they work with.

The scheme recognises the personal impact this has had on many workers and will provide more consistent support across the sector.

It will build on well-being support already available through the Social Care Wales website, where the Covid-19 and well-being pages have been accessed the most since the pandemic started.

The Welsh Government is supporting the scheme, which is being procured and managed through Social Care Wales, with funding of up to $\pm 200,000$. The scheme will be available to around 55,000 social care workers in the independent sector.

Minister for Mental Health and Well-being Eluned Morgan said: "We understand the great strain social care workers have been under at the forefront of the battle against coronavirus, and the toll this has taken on their mental health and well-being.

"This support will help ensure consistent provision of short and longer term emotional support across the sector. "This programme already comes on top of free access for social care workers to "Silvercloud", an independent provider of mental healthcare, which offers four on-line programmes to help people with sleep, stress, and resilience.

"We would urge social care workers who could benefit from it to access this professional support, as it's important they know someone is there to care for them when they need it." Deputy Minister for Health and Social Services Julie Morgan said: "Social care workers play a vital role in supporting some of the most vulnerable people in our communities and within our health service. They have been at the heart of our response to the coronavirus pandemic, however the impact of their work on their own mental health during such pressurised times cannot be underestimated. "Additional support such as this, delivered through Social Care Wales, will provide easy-to-access and timely help and advice for our dedicated social care workers. If you're a care worker and you're struggling, we see the incredible work you're doing and please access the support that is here for you too."

Sue Evans, Chief Executive of Social Care Wales, said: "Every day we see thousands of social care workers providing excellent services to those needing care and support, under the most challenging and stressful of situations, brought on by this awful pandemic.

"This makes it so important we support their health and well-being as much as possible. This is not only vital for the workers themselves but for those they support.

"This new employee assistance programme will be a huge boost to those working in social care, giving them the reassurance that they can access a range of services that can help them and their families through this extraordinarily difficult time. It will also mean there are consistent arrangements across Wales for those working for private and voluntary service providers."

First Minister sets out plans to hold 'Covid secure' 2021 Senedd elections

Plans to ensure the people of Wales can vote safely at the 2021 Senedd elections, and that they take place as planned on 6 May 2021, have been set out by the First Minister of Wales, Mark Drakeford today.

The 2021 Senedd elections are already set to be historic - they are the first elections to be subject to laws made in Wales, and for the first time, 16 and 17 year olds, as well as gualifying foreign citizens, will have the democratic right to vote.

However, the Coronavirus pandemic has created significant challenges to maintaining the safety and integrity of the election.

The First Minister established the Elections Planning Group in June to consider the impact of Coronavirus and in particular, what legislative adjustments might need to be made as a result.

The group has agreed on a number of measures to increase flexibility and resilience of election operations, reflecting public health advice on how best to protect the safety and wellbeing of all involved.

These include:

- Measures to encourage vulnerable voters and others to consider applying for a postal vote and to apply early if possible:
- To provide greater flexibility around the nomination of candidates, as well as postal and proxy voting;
- Measures to ensure the safe operation of polling stations and count venues. The Welsh Government will do everything that it is appropriate to support Returning Officers to make the necessary arrangements;

Ensuring Coronavirus regulations do not inhibit voting.

In addition, the Welsh Government is making contingency plans in the event that the Coronavirus pandemic presents such a serious threat to public health that it is not safe to hold the election in May next year.

Preparations are underway for a draft Bill to enable the Llywydd, the Senedd's Presiding Officer, to postpone the election for up to six months, if that becomes necessary. This would enable Ministers to introduce the required legislation before the Senedd in January, if the situation after Christmas indicates that this is likely to be needed as a last resort.

Addressing the Senedd, First Minister Mark Drakeford said:

"Let me take this opportunity to once again state that this Government's clear intention is that the next Senedd election should be held on 6 May 2021. We are also determined to do everything in our power to ensure people can vote when the election takes place.

"I believe we must pursue every option for enabling people to exercise their democratic right in the face of Coronavirus.

"Much communications activity is planned to encourage postal voting, and everything will be done to make polling stations covid secure."

The First Minister added:

"I would like to thank the members of the Elections Planning Group for their work to help us prepare for next year's Senedd elections.

"This has been a remarkable year and a remarkable Fifth Senedd. Let us work together to ensure that the people of Wales, including those newly enfranchised, can exercise their democratic right safely."

£60,000 pot gives power to people over cash seized from criminals

Your Community Your Choice

Supporting projects that reduce crime and anti-social behaviour.

'Criminals pain – Communities gain



A £60,000 fund will give "power to the people" to decide who receives cash seized from criminals in North Wales.

The "Your Community Your Choice" scheme was launched to reward local

crime busters across the region and North Wales Police and Crime Commissioner Arfon Jones is urging community groups to bid for a share of the pot.

Up for grabs are three grants of up to £2,500 for groups in each of the six counties of North Wales and three grants of up to £5,000 for organisations working in three or more counties.

This is the eighth year of the scheme which is organised by the police and crime commissioner in conjunction with North Wales Police and the North Wales Police and Community Trust (PACT).

Over that period a total of \pounds 310,000 has been awarded to 106 projects working to support the priorities in the commissioner's Police and Crime Plan which sets out a blueprint for policing North Wales.

Entries close on Friday, December 11, with the Your Community, Your Choice entry form available on the Police Commissioner's website, North Wales Police website and PACT website.

A shortlist of applicants will be chosen by a special panel with the winners being decided by a public vote.

The cash for the awards comes partly from money seized by the courts through the Proceeds of Crime Act with the rest from the Police Commissioner's Fund. Commissioner Jones, a former police inspector, said: "These awards are important because they involve the community and the communities decide where the money can best be spent. It gives power to the people.

"A lot of what we fund is aimed at providing something for young people to get involved with in their spare time rather than being tempted to commit crime or indulge in anti-social behaviour.

"We want to support communities so they are able to take responsibility for their own areas.

"Smaller community groups like them can do a great deal to make communities safer, reduce crime and reduce re-offending, It also sends a good message to the communities because it shows we are listening to them."

His message was backed by Assistant Chief Constable Sacha Hatchett who said:

"This is the eighth year of the scheme and it has been a great success because it gives the public and local communities the chance to have a stake in how local issues are addressed and how we together tackle crime and disorder. "I get particular satisfaction that part of the funding comes from the proceeds of crime, so that money is taken out of the pockets of criminals and their ill-gotten gains by the courts and is put back into community initiatives.

"It's turning bad money into good and it's making a real difference because it is local people who recognise and understand their local issues and how to solve them.

<u>"Policing is part of the community and the</u> <u>community is part of policing and this scheme is a</u> <u>positive way of building trust in policing.</u> "It's great to see those relationships flourish because without the community we won't know what's going on, without the community we don't get intelligence, and we can't solve crimes."

PACT chairman Ashley Rogers added: "Your community your choice is a really valuable way of supporting communities and putting the choice of which projects are supported in their hands.

"It's a very democratic process which is why I think it's been such a long running and successful scheme.

"At a time when community groups are struggling for funding, I was delighted that the Police and Crime Commissioner and the force increased the size of the funding pot by 50%.

"It's a lovely project to be involved with and you can directly see the benefits from the funding in strengthening our resilient communities."
