£340m Support for Welsh Businesses as New Coronavirus Rules Announced

A set of new targeted restrictions in the hospitality and leisure sectors, together with a £340m support package, has been announced by First Minister Mark Drakeford. The new measures are being introduced as cases of coronavirus accelerate in Wales once again, eroding the gains achieved during the recent firebreak period.

From Friday, pubs, bars, restaurants and cafes will have to close by 6pm and will not be allowed to serve alcohol. After 6pm they will only be able to provide takeaway services.

Indoor entertainment and visitor attractions must also close

First Minister Mark Drakeford, said:

"Unfortunately, the virus is moving incredibly quickly across Wales and is eroding the gains we made during the firebreak period. We now need to take further steps together as a nation to protect people's health and slow the spread of coronavirus.

"This virus - and this pandemic - continues to be full of unpleasant surprises. It thrives on our normal human behaviour and all those places and opportunities where we come together.

"It underlines why we need to take further, targeted action now. We will focus these changes on places where we meet and where coronavirus thrives, drawing on recent evidence from the UK SAGE group of experts about what interventions have had the biggest impact on the virus." The Welsh Government is making a further £340m available through the Economic Resilience Fund to support businesses affected by the new changes to the regulations. It will include a specific fund to support hospitality and tourism businesses.

The new Welsh Government support is split into two funds: a £160m Restrictions Business Fund and a £180m sector-specific Economic Resilience Fund grant scheme.

The Restrictions Business Fund will enable eligible businesses in the hospitality, tourism and leisure sectors which pay non-domestic rates (NDR) to access grants of up to £5,000.

It is estimated around 60,000 businesses, with a rateable value of under £150,000 will receive this support.

Businesses not on the NDR system, will be able to continue to apply to local authorities for the Lockdown Discretionary Grant of up to £2,000.

In addition, hospitality, tourism and leisure businesses will be able to access a sector specific Economic Resilience Fund grant scheme.

Small and medium sized businesses meeting the criteria could receive up to £100k. Larger Welsh-based businesses could receive up to a maximum of £150k.

This part of the package is expected to support up to 8,000 businesses in these sectors and a further 2,000 in the related supply chains.

More information about the funding and how it can be accessed will be published on the Business Wales website in the coming days.

Economy Minister Ken Skates said:

"These are incredibly difficult days for businesses and these decisions have not been taken lightly.

"We expect today's £340m announcement to support tens of thousands of businesses and help protect many more jobs and livelihoods. It must also be remembered that UK Government support is also available to businesses.

"We will continue to do everything we can to support our firms and our people through these challenging times."

FREE FLU VACCINE now available for **OVER 50s across WALES**

From next week [Tuesday 1 December] NHS Wales' free flu vaccination will be available for anyone aged 50 or over, it has been announced.

Earlier this year the Welsh Government committed to the roll-out of Wales' largest ever influenza vaccination programme to protect people from the risks of flu. The Welsh Government secured nearly 460,000 additional vaccines for 2020/21 and these are currently being made available to all GP practices and community pharmacies in Wales

Those aged 50 and over should now expect to be contacted by their GP practice or can contact their local pharmacy to arrange a vaccination.

By mid-November more than 750,000 vulnerable people, NHS staff and schoolchildren in Wales had taken up the offer of a free flu vaccine. Of those aged over 65, 70% had also been vaccinated - levels substantially higher than during the same period last year.

The Minister for Health and Social Services, Vaughan Gething, said,

"This winter more and more people in Wales are taking-up the offer of a free flu vaccine. We have made great progress to protect the most vulnerable in our community and a further 460,000 people in Wales will now be able to benefit from the protection the vaccine offers them and our NHS services."

"Extending the flu vaccine to everyone aged 50 or over will help prevent more people becoming ill and reduce pressure on the NHS this winter. I would urge anyone who is eligible to follow the example of the huge numbers of people vaccinated already and have the vaccine."

The Chief Medical Officer for Wales, Frank Atherton, said: "Everyone who is eligible for a NHS flu vaccine can be confident about having it to protect themselves and those around them this winter. Rolling-out the vaccine to all over 50s will protect them and others in our communities in every part of Wales and help protect the NHS this winter."

Betsi Cadwaladr University Health Board TAKEN OUT OF SPECIAL MEASURES

Betsi Cadwaladr University Health Board is to be taken out of special measures, the Minister for Health and Social Services, Vaughan Gething has confirmed today (Tuesday 24th November).

The health board will be de-escalated from special measures to targeted intervention with immediate effect.

Services including maternity and out-of-hours, have already come out of special measures in 2019.

Vaughan Gething said: "I have decided that Betsi Cadwaladr University Health Board will come out of special measures and move into targeted intervention. My decision is informed by the advice I received following a meeting between the Chief Executive of NHS Wales, Healthcare Inspectorate Wales and Audit Wales.

"We have seen improvements across the health board and have greater confidence that it will make further progress. Throughout the pandemic the organisation has worked hard to play its role in caring for people affected by the virus. During what has been an unsettling time for public health across the world, I'm pleased to announce this positive news for North Wales and NHS Wales."

Local Member of the Senedd, Ken Skates, said:

"Throughout the Covid-19 pandemic, NHS staff in North Wales have worked heroically to help protect people.

Today's welcome news that BCUHB has come out of special measures is recognition of how the health board has managed the pandemic and implemented significant improvements.

"The work of improving health services in North Wales will continue and today's announcement will provide very welcome assurance to patients and staff that Betsi Cadwaladr is heading in the right direction."

The Health Minister added: "I want to thank everyone at the health board who has contributed to improving services. The progress has only been made because of the

commitment and hard work of our staff. Whilst there has been improvement, there are still areas of concern such as mental health and the health board fully recognises there is still further work to do. Targeted intervention is still a heightened level of escalation that requires significant action on the part of the health board.

"The Welsh Government has committed a further £82m per year over three-and-a-half years to support the health board as it enters a new phase under targeted intervention and continues its ongoing work to improve. This substantial investment will be used to improve unscheduled care; build sustainable planned care, including orthopaedics; and deliver improvements in mental health services."

FOUR NATIONS AGREE NEW RULES FOR THE FESTIVE PERIOD

A broad set of UK-wide measures to help people come together with their loved ones during the festive period, in a way that is as safe as possible, have been agreed by the governments of the UK's four nations.

Speaking after a meeting of the four governments, the First Minister of Wales, Mark Drakeford said:

"This has been a very long and difficult year for everyone.

All our lives have been turned upside down by the coronavirus pandemic.

"Everyone has done so much to help control the spread of the virus and to save lives. But that has meant many sacrifices, including not seeing family and close friends. We are all looking forward to Christmas and a chance to spend some time with all those we hold dear. "Today, I met the First Ministers of Scotland and Northern Ireland and Michael Gove, from the UK Government, and I'm pleased we were able to agree a common four-nation plan for the festive period."

The text of a joint statement issued by the four UK governments:

As 2020 draws to a close, we recognise it has been an incredibly difficult year for us all. We have all had to make significant sacrifices in our everyday lives, and many religious and community groups have already had to change or forgo their customary celebrations to slow the spread of coronavirus and save lives.

This cannot be a 'normal' Christmas. But as we approach the festive period, we have been working closely together to find a way for family and friends to see each other, even if it is for a short time, and recognising that it must be both limited and cautious.

Even where it is within the rules, meeting with friends and family over Christmas will be a personal judgement for individuals to take, mindful of the risks to themselves and others, particularly those who are vulnerable. We need everyone to think carefully about what they do during this period, balancing some increased social contact with the need to keep the risk of increased transmission of the virus as low as possible. This is particularly important when considering those who are vulnerable, and before deciding to come together over the festive period we urge the consideration of alternative approaches such as the use of technology or meeting outside.

In this context, the four administrations have reached agreement on a single set of UK-wide measures to help

people come together with their loved ones in a way that is as safe as possible.

Today we have agreed that:

- Travel restrictions across the four administrations and between tiers will be lifted to provide a window for households to come together between the 23rd and 27th of December.
- Up to three households can form an exclusive 'bubble' to meet at home during this period. When a bubble is formed it is fixed, and must not be changed or extended further at any point.
- Each Christmas bubble can meet at home, at a place of worship or an outdoor public place, but existing, more restrictive rules on hospitality and meeting in other venues will be maintained throughout this period.

It is important that everyone respects and abides by the rules of each nation wherever they choose to spend the festive period. Where there are any variations in our approach, these will be communicated by each administration accordingly. Further guidance will be provided in due course.

The winter holiday period is a time often spent with family and friends, with schools and offices closing and people travelling over the bank holidays. Many have already begun making their plans, and we are today providing clarity to help people make the right choices for them, and enjoy time with those closest to them while staying within the rules to protect us all.

We are currently working on an important project on behalf of Betsi Cadwaladr University Health Board (BCUHB) and Betsi Cadwaladr Public Health Team (Public Health Wales NHS Trust).

The project: "Healthy Weight in Childhood" Research
The project is research work focused on healthy weight in childhood
across North Wales. This is an important area of focus. It will
enable us to generate a greater understanding of behaviour,
attitudes, motivations, influences, needs, barriers and experiences
towards healthy weight in childhood. This will be used to:
Enable the public health team to better understand and engage with
children and their families with healthy weight messages; and
To support the development of a comprehensive package of support
for parents and guardians of those children identified as overweight
or obese.

Survey with parents and quardians

A key part of the research work is a survey with parents and guardians of children aged 5 to 18 years old. The survey will help us to understand parents' views and experiences about healthy weight in childhood. It will explore their attitudes, motivators and influences towards healthy weight management. The survey will examine the potential barriers and current behaviours that may be inhibiting a positive behavioural outcome.

The results from the survey will be used to help inform the insights overall. It will guide the next stage of the research which will be focused on gathering deeper understanding about people's views and experiences through either one-to-one interviews or online focus groups.

So 2020 will go down as the 'unfinished year'; quite an appropriate phrase in the world of classical music I guess. Our concerts in May, June and July were all cancelled due to the Covid 19 situation. This Saturday should have seen the launch our 52^{nd} season with a wonderful programme of music which included the always popular and much loved Dvorak's 9^{th} Symphony - 'For the New World', together with Korngold's Sea Hawk and Samuel Barber's composition Knoxville 1915. We will of course keep you all informed and updated as soon as we are in a position to do so.

So 2020 has been a year like no other - I cliché I know; but it is the reality and whatever we may reflect on about our year, one thing remains certain as indicated in this quotation from one of our favourite composers, Gustav Mahler 'It should be one's sole endeavour to see everything afresh and create it anew'. We have all missed our music and we have a gift for you all at this special time of the year; a time of giving. The Gustav Mahler Society has funded

the production of some Mahler songs in a virtual performance and I am delighted to be able to share this with you:

It is his 'Knaben Wunderhorn' and is performed by the international mezzo soprano Caitlin Hulcup together with her husband, the tenor and musicologist, Florian Thomas. The accompanist is the international Canadian concert pianist Dr Carson Becke.



£60,000 pot gives power to people over cash seized from criminals



A £60,000 fund will give "power to the people" to decide who receives cash seized from criminals in North Wales.

The "Your Community Your Choice" scheme was launched to reward local

crime busters across the region and North Wales Police and Crime Commissioner Arfon Jones is urging community groups to bid for a share of the pot.

Up for grabs are three grants of up to £2,500 for groups in each of the six counties of North Wales and three grants of up to £5,000 for organisations working in three or more counties.

This is the eighth year of the scheme which is organised by the police and crime commissioner in conjunction with North Wales Police and the North Wales Police and Community Trust (PACT).

Over that period a total of £310,000 has been awarded to 106 projects working to support the priorities in the commissioner's Police and Crime Plan which sets out a blueprint for policing North Wales.

Entries close on Friday, December 11, with the Your Community, Your Choice entry form available on the Police Commissioner's website, North Wales Police website and PACT website.

A shortlist of applicants will be chosen by a special panel with the winners being decided by a public vote.

The cash for the awards comes partly from money seized by the courts through the Proceeds of Crime Act with the rest from the Police Commissioner's Fund.

Commissioner Jones, a former police inspector, said: "These awards are important because they involve the community and the communities decide where the money can best be spent. It gives power to the people.

"A lot of what we fund is aimed at providing something for young people to get involved with in their spare time rather than being tempted to commit crime or indulge in anti-social behaviour.

"We want to support communities so they are able to take responsibility for their own areas.

"Smaller community groups like them can do a great deal to make communities safer, reduce crime and reduce re-offending, It also sends a good message to the communities because it shows we are listening to them."

His message was backed by Assistant Chief Constable Sacha Hatchett who said:

"This is the eighth year of the scheme and it has been a great success because it gives the public and local communities the chance to have a stake in how local issues are addressed and how we together tackle crime and disorder.

"I get particular satisfaction that part of the funding comes from the proceeds of crime, so that money is taken out of the pockets of criminals and their ill-gotten gains by the courts and is put back into community initiatives.

"It's turning bad money into good and it's making a real difference because it is local people who recognise and understand their local issues and how to solve them.

"Policing is part of the community and the community is part of policing and this scheme is a positive way of building trust in policing.

"It's great to see those relationships flourish because without the community we won't know what's going on, without the community we don't get intelligence, and we can't solve crimes."

PACT chairman Ashley Rogers added: "Your community your choice is a really valuable way of supporting communities and putting the choice of which projects are supported in their hands.

"It's a very democratic process which is why I think it's been such a long running and successful scheme.

"At a time when community groups are struggling for funding, I was delighted that the Police and Crime Commissioner and the force increased the size of the funding pot by 50%.

"It's a lovely project to be involved with and you can directly see the benefits from the funding in strengthening our resilient communities."
