<u>Celebrating the Queen's Jubilee News -from</u> <u>the Senedd-</u>

Ruabon's own celebration of the Queen's 70-year reign was mentioned in the Welsh Parliament this week by local Member of the Senedd Ken Skates.

During a debate on the Platinum Jubilee, Llywydd (Presiding Officer) Elin Jones followed comments by Members reminiscing about fancy dress competitions at Jubilee events in their youth by saying: "At the risk of starting a trend, I did win 'best dressed in carnival' in the Llanwnnen Jubilee carnival in 1977 – and there are photos." When Ken was called to comment on the Platinum Jubilee, he told the Senedd: "To spoil the trend, I am yet to win a best-dressed

competition, but I hope that might change next week at the

Ruabon Platinum Jubilee celebrations!

"I'd like to begin, though, by saying just what a pleasure it is to contribute to this debate, and to thank every organisation in Clwyd South that is organising such a diverse range of celebratory events. I think whether you're a monarchist, a republication or, indeed, indifferent, this special moment in our time really does recognise something that we can all agree on.

"We're celebrating relentless hard work, tireless commitment, loyalty, dignity and respect for duty by the longest-serving monarch in British history. And this is a time for us all to come together in recognising these incredible attributes and to pay our respects to Her Majesty the Queen.

"The Platinum Jubilee will offer us a rare chance for the nation to put aside divisions and to take time to value community, public service and loyalty to others."

He added: "Some people might not choose to celebrate the reign of Queen Elizabeth II in this coming week, but I do hope that everybody will salute the unparalleled and very positive contribution that the Queen has made to our history. As we approach 2023 and thereafter 2024, let's hope that the Queen goes on to become not just Britain's, but the entire world's longest serving monarch." After the debate, Ken added: "I'm really looking forward to the event in Ruabon.

The annual fete and the many other similar events, held in Ruabon in recent years are always fantastic occasions, and this one should be extra special."

North Wales NHS improvement plans raised by Clwyd South MS

Plans to improve health services in north Wales have been raised in the Senedd.

Clwyd South MS Ken Skates yesterday called for the new national Citizen Voice Body to be based in north Wales, which has the country's largest health board.

He also called for an update from Health Minister Eluned Morgan about the Welsh Government's plans to improve services across the region.

Addressing the Welsh Government Trefnydd, Lesley Griffiths, Mr Skates said: "I'd be grateful for a statement from the Minister regarding progress against the Betsi Cadwaladr University Health Board improvement plans that were published in March of 2021. "And could I ask for another statement from the Minister for Health confirming that the Citizen Voice Body will be headquartered in north Wales? The chair of the body, of course, is very familiar with south-west Wales and mid Wales, and most of the NHS is headquartered in south-east Wales, so it stands to reason that the Citizen Voice Body should be headquartered in north Wales, where we have the largest health board and where, arguably, the NHS faces its greatest challenge."

Mr Skates said he had also written formally to the Health Minister, and later added: "The people of north Wales must know whether progress has been made against the improvement plans, which were announced by the former Health Minister as the next stage of improvement after BCUHB was taken out of special measures." From April 2023, the Citizen Voice Body will represent the voices and opinions of the people of Wales in respect of health and social care services. It will be independent of government, the NHS and local authorities but will work with them, and others, to support the continuous improvement of person-centred services.

During the Senedd proceedings, Trefnydd Lesley Griffiths responded: "In respect of the establishment of the Citizen Voice Body, no decisions have been taken as yet as to the location of any of its sites. I think once the Citizen Voice Vody recruitment is completed, the Minister will bring forward a location strategy around the decisions taken. "You ask for an update on the Betsi Cadwaladr University Health Board improvement plan, and, as you're aware, in the previous term of government, back in March 2021, a written statement was issued by the Government outlining the targeted intervention framework for the health board. This is something that, obviously, the Minister for Health and Social Services monitors very carefully.

"I am aware there are further discussions going on, and the Minister will ensure the health board update their website, because I think it is really important that that's done. If there is anything further from the Minister's meeting, I will ask her to issue a written statement." -Ends-

End of an Era

as Wales' last remaining Covid rules to be dropped

Mark Drakeford is expected to announce that the rules will be lifted on Monday, 30thMay.

First Minister Mark Drakeford is expected to announce on Friday the removal of Wales' final remaining Covid rules. While <u>nearly all</u> <u>restrictions were lifted in March this year</u> the decision to scrap the mandatory wearing of face masks in health settings from Monday will mean for the first time since March 2020 Wales will be totally free of coronavirus regulations. The outcome of the latest three-weekly review of the legal regulations will be announced by Mr Drakeford at a press conference at noon on Friday. He is expected to confirm that the final legal requirement, which has seen face coverings remain a mandatory requirement in health and care settings to protect patients, staff, and visitors, will be removed from May 30.

It's understood the Welsh Government will continue to recommend people take simple steps to protect their health including by staying up to date with Covid vaccinations (see the latest on who will be eligible for jabs in the autumn by going <u>here</u>) and self-isolating if

they have Covid-19 symptoms. The legal requirement to self-isolate for positive cases was removed earlier this year.

The decision to remove the restrictions comes in light of an improving picture in terms of infection figures. The number of Covid-19-related patients in hospital is gradually falling, although the NHS continues to experience emergency and pandemic pressures, while the latest Office for National Statistics (ONS) figures showed infection numbers in Wales <u>falling for the fifth week in a</u> <u>row</u>.

WELSH UNIVERSITIES CHANGE LIVES WITH ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE AND DATA SCIENCE

Welsh Government investment in universities collaborating in data science and artificial intelligence is changing lives and helping Wales become an international leader in the field. As part of the Digital Strategy for Wales, £500,000 of funding is being shared between 22 innovative projects.



Wales Data Nation Accelerator (WDNA) is a collaboration between Cardiff, Swansea, Aberystwyth and Bangor universities to help Wales secure long-term data science and AI success.

As data science and AI become more widespread, university research teams are helping people across Wales by ensuring projects are being taken forward with industry so the outcomes can be adopted to improve economic returns, quality of life and sustainability. At the same time this will support creating a skilled and digitally competent workforce.

Professor Matthias Eberl and his team in the School of Medicine at Cardiff University will use AI to help prevent sepsis in abdominal surgery patients. Welsh Government funding has helped them work with partners to support their research.

Investing in this kind of research can help resolve challenges particularly affecting Wales. Aberystwyth University are supporting the agricultural sector by using AI to quickly identify parasites common in grazing livestock in Wales due to our climate. Bangor University are supporting our environment by developing software tools to deploy radar technology along the Welsh coastline. This will provide marine renewable developers, ports and local authorities with valuable, real-time information about the waves and currents in our coastal waters. This research will help find better sites for renewable energy and improve safety.

Minister for Education and Welsh Language, Jeremy Miles said: Wales is home to fantastic higher education research. It is great to see our universities working together to make sure Wales is on the forefront of developments in data science and artificial intelligence. I am pleased that this funding has helped support projects with the power to improve people's lives here in Wales and further afield. WDNA is an example of how a strong higher education sector can support all aspects of our lives and make sure we're prepared for the future.

Minister for Economy, Vaughan Gething said:

Research, science, and technology has never been more important in terms of supporting solution-focussed projects and outcomes to tackle the major global problems of our time.

I am confident this new funding will support our universities, working with industry partners, to use the very latest technological innovation in data science and artificial intelligence to do just that. In doing so, they will help boost the Welsh economy by helping to create the industries of the future, which will generate the new high-quality jobs we want to see across Wales.

Professor Roger Whitaker, Pro Vice-Chancellor elect for Research, Innovation and Enterprise, at Cardiff University said:

The world is changing at an unprecedented pace due to data science and artificial intelligence. This affects almost every sector in Wales. The Universities of Cardiff, Swansea, Bangor, and Aberystwyth have partnered to form the Wales Data Nation Accelerator (WDNA) project, an ambitious programme of research, innovation and training to support digital transformation.

Welsh Government funding for short term 'sprint' projects has enabled partnership with organisations and companies to quickly demonstrate the power and potential of data and AI-driven technologies. This is supporting better health and wellbeing, improved public services, a competitive economy and a greener planet.

My name is Mel Kearsley I work for WCBC Play and Youth Support Team, (many of you may have met me as I used to deliver Safeguarding training for the Childcare Team). I have been in playwork for over 20 years in a variety of settings, most of my role now involves training and supporting playwork learners.

Wrexham has been awarded funding to support 45 learners this financial year to take part in accredited playwork courses.

Level 2 Application of Playwork Practice (L2APP) is a 6 week face to face course which enables learners to start on their playwork journey, this course is recognised by CIW as enough for workers who are in holiday only provision. If workers are in year round setting they will then need to complete the level 2 Diploma on top of the L2app.

All applicants interested in attending a Playwork course will need to adhere to the entry requirements and complete the application form using the link below.
