"We are going to be vaccinating for Influenza (Flu) and hopefully Covid



vaccine also, as from Saturday 23<sup>rd</sup> September for all those patients who are eligible which consists of:

Over 65s, Immunosuppression, at risk with chronic diseases such as: Diabetes, COPD, Asthma, Pregnant Patients, Learning disabilities and

severe mental health, care home residents, frontline staff, carers and children aged 2 and 3 years of age, to name just a few.

These clinics shall be mostly on Saturdays to avoid any disruption to our day-to-day service delivery, but we shall possibly be offering other days as well.

We will be getting in touch with patients first to see who would like one or both of their vaccinations so we can plan and organise and then ensure our clinics are booked with those patients who wish to have their vaccinations (either one or both) and book them in to the most appropriate clinic.

We are looking to vaccinate all our eligible patients as quickly as possible and we hope to see everyone soon for their vaccinations.

We will be getting in touch this week, so if patients can wait until they receive their text message or letter and then we will send them a link to book in (if via text) directly, or they can then contact the surgery to book an appointment (if via letter). We will only be inviting those patients that are eligible. We urge all eligible patients to attend the surgery for their vaccinations rather than going elsewhere.

We are equipped to deliver this vaccination programme quickly and ask patients to kindly wait for their invitations as we are hoping to have completed the programme by the end of October to mid-November.

We have had a new feature installed on our telephone system whereby patients can request a call back and be kept in the queue which is our way of improving service delivery. Feedback so far has been great and we strive to keep improving and making positive changes.

We would like to thank all our patients for their lovely positive feedback and say it really does mean so much to us all to hear such lovely kind words thank you. The team at Ruabon Medical Centre all work extremely hard and are so happy when we receive nice feedback.

We have experienced staff sickness and cannot thank the team enough for all the help and support to ensure the service delivery is not impacted as best we can."

## Wrexham Council budget update

Wrexham Council has been working hard to find savings and efficiencies to bring its budget in line this year.

#### Wrexham Council budget update:

The financial situation for local authorities across Wales is extremely difficult at the moment, however, by acting quickly the council has avoided a potential shortfall of around £23million by the end of the current financial year, with councillors and officers working hard to identify ways to **meet the challenge.** 

#### Councillor Mark Pritchard, Leader of Wrexham Council, said:

"Each and every department is making a contribution to finding these savings, and we're working hard to do this with as little disruption to the public as possible. We've looked at a lot of ideas and options, and although we don't have all the answers yet, we've made huge progress.

"So far we've identified around half of the savings or efficiencies needed. It's not a painless process, but we have no choice but to meet this challenge head-on."

#### Councillor David A Bithell, Deputy Leader of the Council, said:

"It is sensible to take action sooner rather than later.

"It is a difficult time for councils across Wales and we will have to make some tough decisions, but our goal is to continue to provide our local communities with the services they need."

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#### PCSO Funding:

For many years we've helped fund PCSO (Police Community Safety Officer) provision in Wrexham City Centre, but we'll no longer be able to do this because of the extremely difficult decisions we're having to make.

However, we'll continue to work extremely closely with police and other partners as always.

#### Recruitment

Recruitment for new or vacant jobs at the council has been paused, and is only being undertaken for key posts with approval from senior managers and lead members.

A review of the use of agency workers has also started.

#### Carbon reduction

Political discussions are ongoing about what we take forward in this area.

We'll continue to work hard to reduce unnecessary travel by employees and promote other behaviours to help reduce our carbon footprint in Wrexham.

#### City of culture

The council remains fully committed to the bid for City of Culture 2029. The available budget as agreed at Executive Board in 2022 is £500k in 2023/24.

A programme of events is currently being devised with the Interim Board who will confirm their priorities at the next meeting in September. Some of the upcoming events currently being organised for 2023/24 under the City of Culture branding include:

- Wal Goch (football festival)
- Comedy Festival
- St David's Day

The Tour of Britain is also a significant event which contributes to the City of Culture programme, although this is funded from a different source.

#### **Libraries**

We've worked extremely hard and have found a way to save around £19k on new library books, but we'll still be spending around £130k on new books for our libraries this year, and have access to wider resources across the North Wales libraries consortium.

We'll still receive hundreds of new books each month, including copies of all of the top 10 bestsellers in English fiction and non-Fiction, children's books, audio books, large print books and Welsh language books.

We will also continue to buy and provide online e-books and e-audio books through our Borrowbox app.

#### Social care:

Social care charges to the public will be largely unaffected and will continue to be implemented in line with the national policy for fees and charges for social care in Wales.

Some efficiencies will be made by making sure fees continue to be fairly implemented across Wrexham.

#### Car parking charges:

Parking fees in our car parks are still under review and no political decision has been made yet.

#### Discussions are ongoing.

## Student loans: How do they work, what can I borrow and when do I pay it back?

The rules are changing for many students who will take out loans to go to university this year.

Here's what you need to know. How do student loans work?

The details depend on where you live in the UK, but student loans are typically made up of two elements:

- a loan for tuition fees
- a maintenance loan to cover living costs

Most people are entitled to the **tuition fee** element, **which is equal to the annual cost of your course up to £9,250 per year,** capped until academic year 2024-25.

The **maintenance loan** is intended to cover accommodation, food, books and any equipment you need. It is means-tested, so the amount you get depends on your family's household income.

You might get extra money if you are disabled or have children. If you are under 25 and have no contact with your parents, **you might be able to apply as an "estranged student"**. This means your parents' financial situation is not taken into consideration.

How can I find out how much I can borrow?

The amount of maintenance help available varies across the UK.

- Students from England can use the loans calculator on the Student Finance England website
- Students from Wales can go to <u>Student Finance Wales</u>

- Students from Scotland can go to <u>Student Awards Agency</u>
   Scotland
- Students from Northern Ireland can go to <u>Student Finance</u> <u>Northern Ireland</u>

When and how do I apply?

It is not too late to apply for student finance if you want to start university this year, even though the official deadlines have passed.

It means you might receive some or all of your money a bit later.

You do not need a confirmed place at university to apply and, if your plans change, you can cancel or change your application before the start of your course.

The process is different depending on where you live:

- The <u>Student Loans Company</u> processes all applications for students in <u>England and Wales</u>
- Students in Scotland apply through the <u>Students Awards</u>
   Agency Scotland
- Students from Northern Ireland apply through <u>Student Finance</u> <u>Northern Ireland.</u>

How do I get the money?

The **tuition fees** part is paid directly to your university or education provider.

The **maintenance loan** is paid directly to your bank account. If you applied before the deadline, you



should have the money before your course starts.

How much interest will I be charged? You are charged interest on the loan from the day you take it out, but the amount varies across the UK. It is important to understand that the terms and conditions can change after you have borrowed the money - any interest-rate rises will apply to all student loans not just new applications.

For students starting courses this year in **England**, the interest rate will normally be set at **the retail price index (RPI) measure of inflation**. It will be **capped at 7.3% from September**. Previously, it was RPI plus 3%, with an interest rate cap that has varied over the years.

For courses in:

- Wales, the rate is <u>RPI plus 3%</u> <u>capped at 7.3% from</u> <u>September</u>
- Scotland, it is 6%
- Northern Ireland, it is 6%

The amount graduates pay back will depend on how much they earn.

When do I have to start paying back my student loan?

You do not have to start repaying your loan until you earn a certain amount of money after graduation.



The earliest you will start repaying is the April after you leave your course.

Payments are made automatically through the tax system.

You generally repay 9% of the amount you earn over the threshold.

However, the amount you can earn before you have to start repaying differs across the UK.

The threshold for students starting university in **England** this year will be £25,000, down from £27,295 last year.

In Wales it will be £27,295, in Scotland £27,660 and in Northern Ireland £22,015.

### You do not repay anything if you earn less than the threshold.

#### When are student loans written off?

In England, new rules mean that anyone starting university this year will pay back their loan for 40 years before it is written off, regardless of how much is owed - a decade longer than last year.

In **Wales** and **Scotland** it is 30 years, and in **Northern Ireland** it is 25 years.

You still have to repay your student loan <u>if you leave your course</u> <u>early.</u>

Some people may opt to make extra repayments to clear some or all of their loan early - there is no penalty for doing so.

## NEW RECORD HIGH for Welsh Food and Drink exports

Welsh Food and Drink exports were worth £797 million in 2022, the highest recorded yearly value,

Rural Affairs Minister Lesley Griffiths has announced. First published: 25<sup>th</sup> July 2023; Last updated: 25<sup>th</sup> July 2

The Minister has revealed the industry's exports increased by £157m between 2021 and 2022, representing a 24.5% rise.

This is a larger percentage increase than the UK as a whole, which grew by 21.6%.

The highest value export categories for Welsh Food and Drink in 2022 were Meat and Meat Products at £265m, a 42% increase from 2021, and Cereal Preparations which rose from 16% to £160m.

The value of the sector's exports to the EU reached £594m, a £130m increase from 2021. The industry's export to non-EU countries were worth £203m in 2022, a large growth from £176m in 2021.

France is now the highest value destination for Welsh food and drink exports at £150m. Other top destinations include the Republic of Ireland (£145m), Belgium (£78m), Netherlands (£52m), and Germany (£51m).

Welsh food and drink exports continue to go from strength to strength, ensuring people in many countries abroad can enjoy high-quality products from Wales.

The sector's skills, drive for innovation and passion to provide the best possible produce is clear from today's results.

I am pleased to be able to make this announcement at the Royal Welsh Show which provides companies from across Wales with the opportunity to showcase their brilliant food and drink, and I'm sure visitors from near and far are enjoying it.

The Minister has also announced a new scheme, the Strategic Innovation Scheme, to provide a comprehensive range of business support services to food and drink businesses across Wales.

As part of this, Project Helix, which offers technical and commercial support to the Welsh food and drink industry, will continue until March 2025.

Latest figures show Helix, which launched in 2016, has provided a £355 million economic boost to the industry, helped create 683 jobs and protected a further 3,647 jobs. More than 700 businesses have been supported through the scheme and almost 2,100 new food and drink products developed.

Thanks to today's announcement, the project will now be able to support larger manufacturers in Wales alongside small and medium-sized enterprises and microbusinesses who have already benefitted.

Mike Woods, Chief Executive of "Just Love Food Company" said: "Since the affiliate joined the business through Project Helix our turnover has grown by over 65% and it wouldn't have been possible without those more robust technical structures in place. Project Helix has helped the business grow and it's helped put a foundation down that will help continue growth."

#### The Minister added:

"The Strategic Innovation Scheme will underpin the Welsh Government's Vision for the Food and Drink Industry.

As part of this, Project HELIX, which has had a hugely positive effect on Wales' food and drink industry, helping companies to adopt a more efficient and strategic approach, will continue until March 2005.

The project's positive impact is clear to see through the £355 million economic boost it has provided as well as the number of new jobs it has helped to create and the thousands it has protected. It has also been key in upskilling the Welsh workforce, and supported businesses to develop new products."





