Welsh Government to ban disposable vapes and back plans for raising smoking age

Deputy Minister for Mental Health and Wellbeing Lynne Neagle has confirmed the Welsh Government will press ahead with plans to ban disposable vapes and support UK Government's legislation to increase the smoking age and restrict sales of vapes.

First published: 29th January 2024. Last updated: 29th January 2024. It follows the publication as agreed on Monday 29th January.

The outcome of the four nations consultation 'Creating a smokefree generation and tackling youth vaping'.

The consultation closed on 6th December and received 27,921 responses, (1,018 from Wales).

The UK Government will now bring forward a Tobacco and Vapes Bill at the earliest opportunity that will take measures to:

 change the age of sale for all tobacco products, cigarette papers and herbal smoking products whereby anyone born on or after 1 January 2009 will never legally be sold (and also in Scotland never legally purchase) tobacco products alongside prohibiting proxy sales, and changing warning notices

- introduce regulation making powers to restrict flavours, point of sale and packaging for vaping products (nicotine and nonnicotine) as well as other consumer nicotine products
- introduce new enforcement powers for England and Wales for breaches of age of sale legislation for tobacco and vapes (nicotine and non-nicotine) and other consumer nicotine products
 - 1. The Welsh Government, along with the UK and Scottish governments intend to introduce legislation to implement a ban on disposable vapes, including both nicotine and non-nicotine containing products due to their significant environmental impacts.

Deputy Minister for Mental Health and Well-being, Lynne Neagle said:

"Smoking is the leading cause of preventable illness and premature death in Wales. It causes a quarter of all cancer deaths in the UK and is responsible for 80,000 preventable deaths in the UK of which around 5,600 are in Wales, each year.

Whilst vapes can be useful to some smokers in supporting smoking cessation, data shows the number of children using vapes has tripled in the past 3 years. Due to their nicotine content and the unknown long-term harms, vaping carries a risk of harm and addiction for children. The use of single-use vapes has also grown in recent years to the point that almost 5 million are either littered or thrown away each week. Not only is this extremely wasteful because of their hard to recycle components, but disposable vapes are known to be used by children and when littered they can release toxic chemicals into the environment.

We want to take all actions possible to stop young people

from starting smoking in the first place, to prevent youth vaping and to tackle the effects single-use vapes are having on our environment.

I am grateful to all those from Wales who contributed to this consultation. We will now work jointly with the other nations and take collective action to tackle the harms caused by smoking and youth vaping across the UK.

The Welsh Labour Government wants to see

lifts installed at Ruabon Railway Station

to help people with mobility issues, families with young children and commuters carrying heavy luggage move between platforms.

Clwyd South MS Ken Skates raised the issue in the Senedd this week and was told the Welsh Government is 'doing everything we can at our end'. Whooping Cough Vaccination urged as cases rise rapidly in Wales



Public health experts in Wales are encouraging all pregnant women and parents of babies and young children to ensure that they have had their Pertussis (whooping cough) vaccinations as cases in Wales show rapid increase in recent weeks.

Whooping cough is an infection of the lungs and breathing tubes caused by Bordetella pertussis bacteria. It spreads very easily and can sometimes cause serious problems, especially in infants under 12 months old.

Whooping cough has waves of increased infection every three to four years and in the last few weeks, notifications of whooping cough have risen sharply. Following reduced circulation in 2020-2022, current notifications are at levels not seen since 2012 and 2015. Laboratory confirmed cases have not yet risen in line with notifications but are likely to increase as test results are reported.

Whooping cough is a vaccine preventable disease. The pertussis vaccine is included in the <u>'6-in-1vaccine'</u> given to babies at eight, 12 and 16 weeks.

In 2013 a vaccination programme was also established to offer the pertussis vaccination to all expectant mothers in the UK from weeks 16 - 32 of pregnancy. This is to help protect their newborn infants from whooping cough until they are old enough to receive first their '6 in 1' vaccine at aged 8 weeks.

As immunity against pertussis wanes over time, a booster dose is also given in the pre-school boosters (normally given at 3 years 4 months) with the aim of reducing whooping cough in older age groups being passed on to unvaccinated or partially vaccinated babies.

Rates of 6 in 1 vaccination in Wales remain high, but in the last year rates of vaccination in pregnancy have fallen from over 80% to 70%.

Dr Christopher Johnson, Consultant Epidemiologist and Head of Public Health Wales' Vaccine Preventable Disease Programme, explains: "We typically see high rates of whooping cough peaking every three to four years, and with rates supressed during the lock downs of the pandemic we are naturally seeing a resurgence this year.

"Whooping cough is highly contagious and is spread by breathing in small droplets in the air from other people's coughs and sneezes. Babies under six months old are at most risk. It can be very serious and lead to pneumonia and permanent brain damage. Young babies with whooping cough are at risk of dying from the disease.

"The protection you receive from the pertussis vaccine in pregnancy passes on to your unborn baby and protects the baby in the first few weeks of their life, until they receive their first routine immunisation when they are two months old. The vaccine also protects you from getting

whooping cough and lowers the risk of you passing it on to your baby.

"We would urge all pregnant women and parents of babies and young children to ensure they take up their offer of vaccination when given, or to ask their GP, mid wife or health visitor if they believe they may not have had it."

The North Wales Train Ride through 'Natural Beauty'

Passenger David Powell enjoyed a journey on the magnificent Cambrian Line

It was a slight shame that there was no buffet car or trolley service but the journey was only an hour long so no worries. Transport for Wales WiFi was easy to log onto on my phone so it was Happy Days and I settled down to a scenic journey (which cost £8.40) return.

Sure enough, it was a beautiful trip in itself, never mind the destination.

There are 13 stops but some are by request.

The Transport for Wales train from Porthmadog to Barmouth on the Cambrian Line passes Harlech Castle (Image: David Powell).

Before long we came through Llandecwyn, with the expanse of Tremadog Bay on the right then Talsarnau where the tracks were flanked by waterlogged fields with sheep and the reflections of slivers of silver cloud.



Soon we stopped at the next station where Harlech Castle loomed imposingly on the left.

On the right, woolly-hatted players at Royal St David's Golf Club were warming up on the practice ground.

Residents in Flintshire have been put on alert for a suspicious caller purporting to be from Scottish Power. Police have received reports of a man knocking on doors in Deeside saying he needs to carry out a survey inside the house. After a resident made inquiries with the energy firm, it was confirmed

none of its staff was working in the area at the time. **North Wales Police** (NWP) is now warning householders to be on their guard.

The NWP North **Flintshire** team said it had been alerted by several concerned residents. He was described as being around 6ft tall and wearing a hi-vis jacket with a red lanyard. He was said to be carrying a clipboard in his arm.

Doorstep criminals tend to be split into two groups. Bogus callers posing as council staff, charity collectors or meter readers try to get into homes to steal money and valuables. Some try to gain trust in order to get personal details. The other group is rogue traders who cold-call offering repairs and improvements, often charging inflated prices for shoddy for work that isn't needed.
