Finance issues

The Audit Wales report also states that investigations into financial irregularities identified by them and by the EY review are complex and has had a disruptive effect on the finance team.

A small number of staff from our Finance Department remain suspended whilst the investigation is ongoing. The health board has a duty of care to staff and cannot comment further until the investigation has concluded.

Industrial action

Further industrial action by junior doctors takes place in Wales for 72 hours from Wednesday 21st February.

As happened during the action taken in January, this will impact our hospital services. We are working with our staff to keep patients safe during planned strikes while delivering the best care possible.

It does mean, however, that some planned care appointments will need to be rearranged. Anyone who has an appointment that needs to be rearranged will have been contacted directly. If anyone has a planned appointment then they should still attend unless they are contacted directly to say otherwise.

During this time we would urge anyone who requires care or support to contact NHS 111 Wales in the first instance to be advised about the most appropriate service, which might be self-care at home, a visit to the

Special Measures progress one year on

We're planning a series of special briefings for our staff, key stakeholders and the public to describe the progress we've made since Welsh Government placed the Health Board into Special Measures in February 2023. Invitations to these briefings are on their way to your inbox, and we hope you will be able to join in.

Not too late to protect against COVID-19 and flu

Flu and COVID-19 are still circulating in communities across North Wales. Over the last four weeks more than 200 inpatients at our hospitals have tested positive for flu. This is the highest level since the first week of January 2023.

The best way to protect against serious illness caused by COVID-19 and flu is to get the COVID-19 booster and annual flu vaccine.

Walk-in COVID-19 and flu vaccination clinics for eligible adults are being held at our community vaccination centres this week and until the end of March. <u>Check your eligibility for the vaccines</u> and <u>dates, times and</u> <u>locations of our clinics</u>.

Measles outbreaks

We are concerned about recent outbreaks of measles and are calling on parents to ensure their children have had the MMR vaccine. While data shows children in North Wales have a higher level of protection against measles than many other areas of Wales and the UK, MMR vaccine coverage at 91% is below the recommended level of 95%. Any parent who thinks their child may have missed an MMR vaccine should check the vaccination record in their red book. If you need to catch up with an MMR vaccine, please contact your <u>GP surgery</u> or <u>health visitor</u>.

Our <u>school nursing</u> and immunisation teams are reviewing records and offering catch up MMR vaccination to secondary school age children who need it as part of routine HPV, MenACWY and 3-in-1 teenage booster vaccine clinics.

Whooping cough on the rise

Suspected cases of whooping cough have risen rapidly in recent weeks. Anyone who is pregnant or has a new baby should make sure that they or their child has the pertussis (whooping cough) vaccine and all other routine vaccinations. Anyone with questions should speak to their <u>community midwife</u> or <u>health visitor</u>.

<u>University Health Board</u> <u>Update Monday 19th February 2024</u> Reducing waiting times

We are seeing tangible benefits for the people of North Wales as we continue to improve the health service.

We are determined to reduce waiting times for treatment, and in the 12 months between November 2022 and November 2023 we have seen the following improvements.

• Diagnostic and therapy waiting list numbers down more than 5%;

- Echocardiogram waiting list numbers down more than 30%;
- Radiology waiting list numbers down more than 30%;
- Physiotherapy waiting list numbers down more than 12%;

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• Speech and Language waiting list numbers down more than 17%.

We understand that there is still much work to do to bring down waiting lists for a wide range of services even further. We will keep you informed of our progress.

We have welcomed a new Audit Wales report which states that, compared with a year ago, the Board is in a more stable position and that working relationships amongst senior leaders are more positive.

We're excited to announce that having won UK Tree of the Year in 2023, the Wrexham Sweet Chestnut is now through to the European Tree of the Year!

The Wrexham Sweet Chestnut stands proudly in Acton Park and received some well-deserved recognition in September 2023 when it competed with 12 other nominees throughout the UK to be crowned UK Tree of the Year. This automatically puts it through to the European stages where it will compete with trees from all over Europe to claim the title.

It's easy to see why the Wrexham Sweet Chestnut is now heading to Europe; standing an impressive 24 metres tall and boasting a 6.1m circumference, this veteran tree is estimated to be approximately 480 years old which means it began growing in 1534, during the times of King Henry VIII. It has withstood many challenges during its half-millennium, from post-war plundering of the park for firewood in the forties to dozens of deadly storms, including that of 2021 when many neighbouring trees lost limbs or were toppled completely.

To celebrate getting into this prestigious competition will be hosting events and educational visits around the Wrexham Sweet Chestnut throughout February.

We want to celebrate Acton Park and all the visitors that the tree has seen over the years, even our four legged friends! A fun dog show will be held on Sunday 11th February 11.30-4pm around the tree, inviting dogs and their owners to take part in categories such as waggiest tail and scruffiest dog. 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"Sisters under the Rising Sun" by Heather Morris

In the midst of World War II, an English musician, Norah Chambers, places her eight-year-old daughter Sally on a ship leaving Singapore, desperate to keep her safe as the island falls to the Japanese Army. Welsh Australian nurse Sister Nesta James has enlisted alongside the Allied forces. As Singapore falls to the Japanese she joins the terrified cargo of people, including the heartbroken Norah, crammed aboard the *Vyner Brooke* merchant ship. Only two days later, they are bombarded from the air off the

coast of Indonesia, and in a matter of hours, the *Vyner Brooke* lies broken on the seabed. Nesta and Norah reach the beaches of a remote island, only to be captured and held in one of their notorious Japanese POW camps. The camps are places of starvation and brutality, where disease runs rampant. But even here joy can be found in music, where Norah's 'voice orchestra' has the power to transport the internees out of the squalor and into the light. Sisters in Arms Norah and Nesta devote themselves to the women's survival while discovering their own extraordinary reserves of courage, love and strength. An amazing true story, well worth reading.

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LLANDONNA, IN NATIONAL PUB AWARDS <u>FINAL</u>

The finalists in the influential pub industry awards, PubAid's Community Pub Hero Awards, have been announced and Yr Owain Glyndwr, Llandonna has been shortlisted.

Yr Owain Glyndwr was nominated by owner, Mark Williams, who nominated the pub in the Community Support Hero Category which saw competition from almost 1000 other pubs nationwide.

This Community Support Hero Award recognises licensees who help their communities. It recognises pubs that are a 'good neighbour' to their local community.

The pub, which was bought just under two years ago, had previously become run down. It was shortlisted because the new owners have brought it back to life. The owners have done various activities to bring the community together and raise money for a local church and cancer ward, including a Boxing Day swim and tractor rally. The team check in on regulars if they are unwell and take them food. It is a local with the community at its heart.

Owner, Mark said "As freehold owners of a traditional rural village pub, we are delighted to be selected to the final stages.

"After purchasing and redeveloping the premises in February 2022 we felt, with so many pubs closing their doors due to reduced custom and rising costs, that it was important to keep the village pub open for the community. We are so pleased to have fantastic support from our locals.

"Being the only public business in the village, we employ nine local staff and provide freshly prepared food sourced locally where possible, a fantastic range of beers and guest Ale and a warm welcome to both local and tourists alike which also enhances the holiday attraction for the local area.

"With both Tammie and I in full time employment, we took the pub over and feel we have transformed a tired and quiet pub into a busy local and an important part of the community and contribute to help organise local charity events, including bingo, annual tractor rally and tug of war. Our annual Boxing Day swims have attracted over 100 locals to the beach to raise money. Our latest charity effort is to provide a community defibrillator at the pub and we thank everyone for their contribution and donations towards our fundraising events."

The winners will be announced at an award ceremony, sponsored by Matthew Clark, at the Houses of Parliament on 5 March and all shortlisted pubs are invited to attend along with industry leaders and MPs.

Des O'Flanagan, co-founder of Pub Aid, added: "We launched these awards to celebrate the great work that pubs do for their community. Yr Owain Glyndwr is a perfect example of how pubs support and are a hub for many people in their community. The awards are in their fifth year and the volume of entries this year was staggering. What clearly came across from reading all the entries is that there are so many publicans that are doing amazing work nationwide. It was very hard to get to a shortlist so even getting to the finals is an amazing accolade for Yr Owain Glyndwr."

Pub Aid, which organises the awards in association with Matthew Clark and the All Party Parliamentary Beer Group, has refreshed the awards and created more categories to congratulate more community pubs throughout the UK. There are 33 finalists in total across five categories. Ends

The Categories

<u>Community Support Hero:</u> recognising licensees who help their communities. If your pub is a 'good neighbour' to your local community, then this award is for you!

<u>Charity Fundraising Hero</u>: recognising pubs who support charities and other good causes through fundraising. This is not just judged on the amount of money raised, but on how it was done.

<u>Community Hero Regular</u>: recognising an individual or group of customers who help the pub's fundraising efforts or its work to support the community.

<u>Community Sport Hero:</u> recognising pubs who bring the community together via sport. This could be events for national sport competitions or at a grass roots level with local teams.

<u>Community Sustainability:</u> recognising how pubs are helping the environment whether that's in pub itself or within the local area.

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Community Pub Hero Awards: Pub-Aid launched its Charity <u>Fundraiser Pub Awards in 2018</u>, with sponsorship from C&C and support from the All-Party Parliamentary Beer Group. The awards ran again in 2019, sponsored by Matthew Clark, and in 2020, with pubs closed for months due to Covid, they were reshaped and renamed as the Community Pub Hero Awards.

Pub Aid: is a working party created in 2009 to promote UK pubs as a force for good in their communities, sharing the message that they raise over £100m per year for charities and contribute £40 million to grassroots sport.

Pub Aid runs the annual World's Biggest Pub Quiz, which has raised £750,000 since its launch in 2016, the Community Pub Hero Awards and, launched in early 2022, the Grassroots Sports Champions, in association with Sky, to recognise pubs' support for local sports.

<u>The Pub Aid</u> steering group is led by co-founder Des O'Flanagan, and includes a number of well-known figures from the pub world, who lend their time and other resources to help spread the positive messages about pubs' role at the heart of their communities.

Strategy takes new, broad approach to supporting Mental Health

Deputy Minister for Mental Health and Wellbeing launches the New Mental Health and Wellbeing Strategy and the Suicide and Self-harm Strategy for consultation. First published: 20th February 2024. Last updated: 20th February 2024

"We need to think more broadly and creatively about how we support people's mental health and wellbeing,

" Deputy Minister for Mental Health and Wellbeing, Lynne Neagle said as she launched the new <u>Mental Health and Wellbeing Strategy</u> also the <u>Suicide and Self-harm Strategy</u> for consultation today (Tuesday 20th February).

^{ge | 16} The draft strategies, out for consultation until 11th June, aim to change how we think about mental health, empower people to improve their mental health and remove the barriers and stigma around getting help.

With half of mental health conditions impacting people by the age of 14 and 75% by the age of 23, there is a strong focus on prevention through ensuring everyone has equal access to the things they need to maintain good mental health, like exercise, the natural environment and belonging to the community.

There is also a focus on the wider causes of mental health and suicide prevention –including housing, employment and finances – and sets out work is needed across the whole Government and across sectors to improve mental health and wellbeing and to reduce suicide and selfharm in Wales.

Some groups are at greater risk of poor mental health than others and inequalities can contribute to poor mental health. This is why the strategies will promote equity of access, experience and outcome for all.

When people do need help, the strategies recognise that people's needs are diverse and not everyone will need access to clinical or specialist mental health services. The aim is to build on the success of easy to access support like 111 press 2 and online cognitive behavioural therapy, alongside broader approaches to continue to improve support in schools and workplaces. This will provide a 'no wrong door' approach to support mental health and well-being.

Speaking ahead of the launch of the draft strategies, at The Hangout, Cardiff-based mental health and wellbeing hub for young people, the Deputy Minister of Mental Health and Wellbeing, Lynne Neagle said:

Good mental health is as critical to our wellbeing as physical health, and it is affected by so many things in our lives. It is not just a health and social care issue; we need all parts of society and Government to work together to help people maintain good mental health.

We need to change how we talk about and support mental health issues, to better reflect the needs of individuals. We have listened to a range of

views in developing the strategies and people have told us not to medicalise mental health. For most people, whilst they do need support, they don't necessarily need clinical or specialised mental health services.

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⁷ The centre hosting the launch today in Cardiff, is the result of partnership working between Cardiff and Vale University Health Board and Platfform. It is innovative approach to providing trauma informed and compassionate support for young people in a safe and comfortable environment. We need all sectors working together, recognising their role in supporting mental health and well-being. Ewan Hilton, Chief Executive of Platfform, said:

We are delighted to be at the Hangout today, as the strategy consultation is launched. The wellbeing hub here is an example of a new mental health approach we advocate for, which is judgement free, compassionate, and accessible. It is a place where people can connect to others and get support when they need it – and we are really proud of this approach.

We will be engaging with the consultation, recommending progressive approaches and championing the excellent work already happening. Katie Simpson, Deputy General Manager for Children, Young People & Family Health Services at Cardiff and Vale UHB, said:

The Hangout has allowed us to redefine how children and young people across Cardiff and the Vale of Glamorgan access mental health and emotional wellbeing support.

Our aim is always to ensure that children and young people receive the right support at the right time in the right place and hopefully The Hangout reaffirms our commitment to deliver this.

It's been a fantastic journey and seeing the ideas of your young people finally come to fruition through a coproduced service is an amazing milestone. We look forward to continuing to work collaboratively with young people and Platfform to develop and continuously improve services.

for immediate publication <u>MS highlights violence against teachers before</u> <u>meeting</u>

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Member of the Senedd Ken Skates has highlighted increasing violence against staff in Welsh schools.

During First Minister's Questions yesterday (Tuesday), the Clwyd South MS said: "We must respect our teachers and not tolerate violence or abuse against them."

Mr Skates met with the Wrexham Primary Headteachers' Federation late last year and will meet with local heads, Wrexham MS Lesley Griffiths and Education Minister Jeremy Miles today. In the Senedd, he asked Mark Drakeford: "How is the Welsh Government supporting schools facing increasing instances of abuse and violence against staff?

The First Minister responded: "There is a duty on local authorities and schools to ensure schools are a safe environment for all. Recognising the impact that poor behaviour can have on the well-being of staff, we continue to fund education support's well-being services. That service provides free advice and support for schools across Wales."

The issue was one of a number raised with Mr Skates during his November meeting with Wrexham headteachers.

Addressing the First Minister, he said: "There are various challenges in education that have been amplified and intensified as a result of the pandemic, and one is the sharp increase in abuse of teachers and teaching assistants. Attacks have become more frequent, including in primary schools. "Do you agree that we must respect our teachers and not tolerate violence or abuse against them?"

Mr Drakeford told the Senedd: "I absolutely associate myself with what Ken Skates has just said. There is no tolerance at all by this government of abuse of public servants going about the service that they provide, and that is certainly true of teachers and others in the classroom."

The First Minister continued: "Condemnation by itself is never sufficient though, is it? We have to look at the causes of those difficulties and we have to provide help to those who face them in the jobs that they do, and that's the work that the Minister for Education has embarked upon.

There's a toolkit for senior leaders in the education services being prepared to help them to find ways of de-escalating those difficulties; to try to find a way of managing the tensions that arise in the lives of children that spill over into the classroom; to find a way of managing those things by recognising the root causes of them and finding effective ways of helping." After Senedd proceedings had concluded, Mr Skates said he has also made personal representations to the Education Minister regarding funding cuts.

He added: "I have also invited the Minister to meet with me and a delegation of local parents in Clwyd South so he is able to hear first-hand their concerns and the impact these measures would have on their children and local schools." **-Ends-**
