MS welcomes plans for Baby Loss Certificates for Welsh Parents

A North Wales Member of the Senedd has welcomed the Welsh Government's intention to make baby loss certificates available to bereaved parents.

Last month the UK Government launched a voluntary scheme in England to allow parents whose baby died before 24 weeks of pregnancy to apply for a free certificate to provide recognition of their loss.

Clwyd South MS Ken Skates raised the issue with Health Minister Eluned Morgan after being contacted by constituents who wanted the option made available in Wales, and said he was pleased to be told the wheels are already in motion.

He said: "I welcome the Health Minister's confirmation that her officials are working closely with their UK Government counterparts to extend the certification process across Wales later this year.

"Baby loss at any stage of pregnancy is always going to be incredibly sad for those involved and I think something recognising their child's life can provide much-needed comfort to parents in Wales."

In her response to Mr Skates, the Minister said: "Thank you for your email of 26th February on behalf of your constituents regarding the introduction of baby loss certificates in Wales.

"Baby loss at any stage of pregnancy is distressing and I recognise the impact it can have on the entire family. The Welsh Government is committed to ensuring every family is appropriately and compassionately supported and understands the importance for parents to have their pregnancy loss formally recognised.

"On 22nd February, the UK Government launched a voluntary scheme to allow parents whose baby died before 24 weeks of pregnancy to apply for a free certificate to provide recognition of their loss.

This is currently available to any parent who has experienced a loss before 24 weeks in England since September 2018. The UK Government plans to extend the eligibility criteria when it is able to do so.

"Officials are working closely with UK Government counterparts to extend the certification process across Wales later this year."

Currently, all families who experience pregnancy loss at maternity units in Wales are supported by bereavement midwives, and in conjunction with the charity Sands (Stillbirth and Neonatal Death) are offered memory boxes which include a commemorative birth certificate.

The Welsh Government is also collaborating with parent organisations including Sands and other experts to implement the National Bereavement Care Pathways across Wales specifically for miscarriage, stillbirth and baby loss.

Reminder: Free cycling courses coming up book your place!



We have some free cycling courses coming up soon to help adults and families gain confidence cycling on our city roads – is this something you would be interested in?

Content

What will I need to take part? How does it work? How do I book?

The courses will be delivered by Seiclo Clwyd Ltd, who deliver cycle training courses in primary schools across the county.

The instructors are qualified national standards cycling instructors, as well as being trained first aiders who hold enhanced DBS certificates.

These courses are funded by Welsh Government's Road Safety Revenue Grant.

What will I need to take part?

Firstly, you will need a roadworthy bike, and a cycling helmet is highly recommended. You should come prepared wearing appropriate clothing for the weather conditions, such as waterproofs and gloves.

Access to Wrexham Council owned cycles and helmets could be organised as long as Seiclo Clwyd are provided with enough time and information.

Please also remember to bring water and some food/snacks to ensure good levels of concentration.

How does it work?

The courses will start with basic cycle handling away from traffic, progressing to guiet streets and then busier routes.

Each course is limited to 6 riders with courses taking place at 9.30am and 1.30pm on the following dates:

March - Monday 25th, Tuesday 26th, Wednesday 27th and Thursday 28th.

The start location of your course will depend on the day it takes place (see below):

Monday – Acton Park

Tuesday – Stansty

Wednesday - Rhosddu

Thursday – Gwersyllt

New Clinical Lead to Help Drive Improvements in Women's Health

On International Women's Day, Health Minister Eluned Morgan welcomes the appointment of a new clinical lead for women's health, who will help drive

improvements in women's health services across Wales.

Dr Helen Munro, a consultant in sexual and reproductive healthcare, will take up the role of Wales' first ever clinical lead for women's health.

Together with Alex Hicks, the new strategic network manager, she will lead the National Clinical Strategic Network for Women's Health in developing the Women's Health Plan for Wales.

The development of the plan will be underpinned by the results of a wide-ranging survey completed by almost 4,000 women and girls who shared their health experiences.

The Health Minister has also announced £750,000 to commission research, from April 2025, focused entirely on women's health.

Eluned Morgan said:

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am delighted to announce funding for women's health research. Research into women's health has often been overlooked and underfunded and we know far too little about many conditions that affect women and girls every day, often with debilitating effects.

This research will be based upon a prioritisation exercise seeking the views of those with lived experience and health and social care professionals on the issues that matter most to them.

Just over half (51%) of women have reported long-standing illness, and 40% of women report feeling limited by these illnesses. This compares with 45% of men who report long-standing illness, and 30% who say they feel limited by their illnesses.

Work to improve women's health services has included the publication of the Quality Statement for Women's and Girls' Health and the Women's Health Implementation Group, which has been looking at issues like pelvic health, use of mesh, endometriosis and faecal incontinence. Pelvic health coordinators and dedicated endometriosis nurses are now working in every health board in Wales.

Progress is being seen in all health boards – examples including the creation of a Women's Health Hub at the Royal Glamorgan Hospital to bring all gynaecology services together in one place.

In addition, training for NHS staff on women's health issues has been introduced alongside the mandatory inclusion of menstrual wellbeing education in the new curriculum.'

Ms Morgan added:

and girls make up just over half the population but we still hear stories of women's voices and concerns about conditions being dismissed.

I have been clear in my commitment to improve women's health services and outcomes for women and girls and addressing the inequalities that exist in our health service.

I am pleased women's health is beginning to get the focus it needs and I expect the new women's health network and the clinical lead to bring together more women's voices from the NHS and beyond to deliver a plan worthy of the name. 'First published: 8th March 2024. Last updated: 8th March 2020.

Author of the Month

Lindsey Davis is a prolific novelist who has been writing historical (crime) fiction for over 30 years.

Born and raised in Birmingham, she read English Literature at Oxford before working for 13 years for the civil service.

In 1985, Davis was inspired to become an author when her romantic novel was runner up for the Georgette Heyer, Historical Novel Prize. Initially writing romantic serials for Woman's Realm magazine, Davis was later inspired to delve into the Roman world by her interest in archaeology and history, leading to the creation of the hugely successful Roman detective, Marcus Didius Falco.

The first novel in the series, The Silver Pigs published in 1989, was awarded the Authors' Club Best First Novel award. Her character of Falco won the Sherlock Award for the best comic detective and her stories have been serialised for Radio 4. Lindsey Davis has won many awards including the Crime Writers' Association Dagger; the Ellis Peters Historical Dagger and was awarded the Crime Writers Association Cartier Diamond Dagger for lifetime achievement in 2011.

She was the inaugural winner of the Barcelona Historical Novel Prize in 2013. The author has been Chair of UK Crime Writers' Association, Honorary President of the Classical Association and Chair of the Society of Authors. Amongst many other accolades, Davis was honoured with the Premio Colosseo in 2010 by the city of Rome.

Her books are published in the UK and US and have been translated into many other languages.


Davis continues to live where she grew up and is the current President of the Birmingham and Midlands Institute.

'I've been taken completely by surprise by sales of *Each Slow Dusk*

Dave says. 'Whenever you start a book, you can never know whether it's going to prove popular. But I've received a huge number of messages and comments from readers. As well as telling me how much they enjoyed it as a detective novel, most of them tell me how much they've enjoyed reading about places they're familiar with. Some even tell me that they've followed Inspector Probert's route around town as he was trying to solve the case!

'I've also had comments from former Oswestry residents now living in places as far away as Canada and New Zealand, who have said that *Each Slow Dusk* reminds them of home and their younger days.

It's amazing and very pleasing, especially as one of my aims was to project a positive image of our town and the surrounding area'

₩hat would *you* do if you were alone and had a heart attack?

1. Take a 2 minute break and read this:

Let's say it's 5:25 pm and you're driving home after an unusually hard day's work.

2. You are really tired and frustrated.

All of a sudden you have chest pains. They are starting to radiate in your arm and jaw. It feels like you're being stabbed in the chest and heart. You're only a few miles away from the nearest hospital or home.

- 3. Unfortunately you don't know if you can make it...
- 4. Maybe you've taken CPR training, but the person running the course hasn't told you how to help yourself.
- 5. How do you survive a heart attack when you're alone when it happens? A person who is feeling weak and whose heart is beating hard has only about 10 SECONDS!! before losing consciousness.
- 6. But you can help yourself by coughing repeatedly and very strongly! Deep breaths before every cough. Coughing should be repeated every second until you arrive at the hospital or until your heart starts to beat normally.
- 7. Deep breathing gives oxygen to your lungs, and coughing movements boost the heart and blood circulation. Heart pressure also helps to restore a normal heartbeat. This is how cardiac arrest victims can make it to the hospital for the right treatment.
- 8. Cardiologists say if someone gets this message and passes it on to 10 people, we can expect to save at least one life.
- Instead of posting memes, you're helping save lives by spreading this message.
